FROM THE RABBI

Happy August/ Chodesh Tov,

As we enter the dog days of summer, my mind is racing at a million miles an hour. It has already been a rather eventful summer. In the month of July, many of us from TBI visited Beth Joseph in Tupper Lake to celebrate the community's 120th anniversary. While the weather was hot and humid, spirits remained high. As a first-time visitor to the synagogue, I learned so much about the history of the Jewish community in Tupper Lake and throughout the Adirondacks. At the end of the month, our community gathered to hear Audrey Albert brilliantly chant her Bat Mitzvah Torah portion during parshat Masei. We were all so proud of her.

When I wrote in last month's bulletin, Israel was very much in the throes of war. Iranian missiles were raining down all over the countryside, as life was upended during the two-week war. Now, a month after a cease-fire has been reached, there is a quiet, unease that has settled over the region. The IDF has won the war against Hezbollah and Iran, and Israel has outlasted the Assad regime in Syria, yet none of these achievements have brought an end to the war in Gaza. Yes, Hamas as a military unit has resoundingly been defeated on the battle field months ago, but as a political entity and as an ideology, it somehow continues to survive mostly because nothing better has been allowed to replace it. Predictably, famine and disease have spread throughout the Gaza Strip. A humanitarian disaster is being allowed to unfold and once again, Israel is being blamed for what happens in Gaza.

In the middle of this month, I will visit Israel with 20 young strangers from the United States on a Birthright group. As I tour the damage left from this summer's war with Iran as well as the battle sites and massacre memorials from October 7th, I will be left asking, when will the Palestinians be in control of their own fate? When will they embrace peace? When will Gaza and its leaders act more like Egypt, Jordan, and the West? When will a defeated Palestinian leadership in Gaza accept the terms of surrender, like all defeated armies, and release the kidnapped hostages?? When will the Palestinians in Gaza choose to embrace life over the status of victimhood paws? Sure, Israel and the IDF bear some responsibility in the deterioration of humanitarian conditions. Israel must find a safe way to deliver food and humanitarian supplies to Gazans, but where does that leave the democratically elected Hamas? Where are the Arab countries? There is a famine occurring, also largely due to war, in Sudan that nobody knows about. We might hear more about it, if only the international world could blame Israel for the starving Sudanese. Nobody is responsible for Jewish safety and security but Israel, yet somehow when Arabs sacrifice their own, despite everything that we in western philosophy and civilization hold to be holy and true, we turn ourselves into pretzels to accept blame. Yes, Jews rush to life in Israel, but in Gaza, death and martyrdom seem to be prioritized and commodified. The more Palestinian babies that starve to death, the worse Israel looks, and Hamas throws their hands up in the air, as if nothing can be done to avoid this scenario. Hamas was quick to start wars, but they're not very good at winning them. If saving their people meant accepting surrender, Hamas would prefer to martyr every last Palestinian living in Gaza before accepting defeat.

The sad truth is that Hamas lives to fight another day because they're never held accountable

either by the international community or by Palestinians for waging wars that destroy their fragile infrastructure and sacrifice their own civilian population. Hamas will never agree to a cease-fire that forces it to relinquish power. They have never been interested in peace or even statehood. They don't play by the same rules as we in the West have embraced; high standards for the quality of life would mean rejecting Jihadism and a culture of death. Gazans would have to prioritize their own welfare over the destruction of the Jewish state and maybe Hamas would lose influence? Peace means an end to the resistance. Heaven forbid Hamas invests in hospitals, schools, roads, and water treatment facilities over tunnels, rockets, and suicide vests! For Hamas, the suffering of Palestinians IS THE POINT. They live to suffer because it's easier to wage war in a fruitless endeavor, holding on to the hopeless notion that the Jewish state can be delegitimized into disappearing. Israel and the international community have offered a Palestinian state multiple times over the last 80 years, and fair offers were always rejected by a delusional Palestinian Authority holding out for a better deal. When political negotiations broke-down, Hamas and other Palestinian leaders resorted to waves of terrorism campaigns against Israel. Well, Israel isn't going anywhere, but sadly Palestinian children, pregnant mothers, and elderly men are vanishing at an alarming rate. Israel doesn't want or wish unnecessary suffering upon the innocent Palestinians in Gaza. Jews don't believe in blood thirsty revenge. Everyday Israelis call on their own leadership to take responsibility for the failures of October 7th, but when will Palestinians in Gaza be allowed to do the same??? Yes, there is a famine occurring in Gaza, crimes against humanity have occurred, and a genocide may well be under way, but let's be clear about who is truly to blame.

Research shows that members benefit from thoughtful, structured onboarding processes that guide them through accessing key resources, meeting their peers, and building connections in the Temple. These welcoming efforts predict positive outcomes for new members, including greater involvement. Perhaps we should consider a committee to develop a blueprint: **Together at TBI**?

☐ On a more mundane level, there is a need to identify all existing TBI policies. Having a **Policy Review Committee** charged with gathering our policies together (hopefully, into one searchable computer file), dispose of outdated policies, identify policies that require updating, and perhaps, even identify policies that need to be created would streamline the administrative work of the temple.

EVERYTHING YOU WANT TO KNOW ABOUT BETH ISRAEL CEMETERY

Where is Beth Israel Cemetery located?

Main Mill Street in Plattsburgh, New York

When was it established?

It was established in 1861 and incorporated in 1878. In 1926 the Beth Israel Cemetery Association, Inc. was established pursuant to the Membership Corporation Law of the Sate of New York. Members of the Congregation established the Cemetery Association as an entity independent of Temple Beth Israel with its own governing board.

Who can purchase a plot?

All members in good standing of Temple Beth Israel for three years are eligible to purchase a burial plot, including couples where one partner is not Jewish. In specific circumstances, the Temple President has the authority, in consultation with the Cemetery President, to determine the eligibility of anyone who does not meet the eligibility requirement.

What does it mean to purchase a plot?

The purchase of a plot entitles you to be buried in the cemetery; the Cemetery Association, however, remains the owner of the land. You may select your burial plot from available space.

Are cremation burials allowed?

Yes

What other policies govern burial?

- Only Jewish clergy are permitted to officiate at the burial site
- Only Jewish symbols may be placed on gravestones
- · Mausoleums are not allowed
- All plantings must be approved.

Whom can I contact about purchasing a plot or discussing burial practices?

What coordination is required between a funeral home and the Cemetery Association?

Details for burial arrangements require consultation between the funeral home and the Cemetery Association.

TBI Receives \$10,000 Addition to the Woolman Rabbinical Trust Fund

A few months ago, Temple Beth Israel received an unexpected letter from the William A. Meyer Jewish Community Foundation. This Foundation, located in Florida, oversees the Evelyn & Bernard Woolman Family Foundation. The letter indicated that the Foundation was interested in making a donation to Temple Beth Israel's Evelyn & Bernard Woolman Rabbinical Trust Fund.
